

Heartworms

Heartworms are parasites that actually live inside the large blood vessels and chambers of the dog's beating heart. They grow up to 14 inches long and can occur in large numbers and interfere with circulation. These microscopic worms circulate in the bloodstream and are transmitted from dog to dog by mosquitoes.

Heartworm disease has spread throughout most of the United States. In epidemic areas like the South, virtually all dogs living outside develop heartworms unless they receive heartworm prevention medicine. Since the risk is sure to increase, we strongly recommend heartworm prevention for metropolitan areas. An easy to use "once-a month" chewable tablet, Interceptor is guaranteed to prevent not only heartworms, but also intestinal roundworms, whipworms and hookworms.

Treatment of dogs with adult heartworm infection is costly, difficult and risky. Prevention is simple.

Parasites

Parasites can affect your pet in a variety of ways, ranging from simple irritation to causing life-threatening conditions if left untreated. Some parasites can even infect and transmit diseases to you and your family. You can reduce the risk of parasitic infection to your family by eliminating parasites from pets; restricting access to contaminated areas, such as sandboxes, pet "walk areas," and other high-traffic areas; and practicing good personal hygiene. An important component of prevention is a year-round parasite control program.

Feral Cat Surgeries

A Feral is a cat/kitten that can not be touched or handled.

- Cats/kittens must be feral to be accepted for surgery without an appointment.
- Check-in is between 8:30 & 9:30 a.m.
- Cats/kittens must be contained in a humane trap for their safety. Only one cat/kitten per humane trap.
- It is recommended to perform a FELV/Fiv/HWT test on all feral cats/kittens. It is mandatory if you are requesting the leukemia vaccine.
- A Rabies vaccine is recommended to be admitted into surgery.
- Ears will be notched to identify cat/kitten as feral. This also serves as an indicator that the animal has been spayed/neutered.
- Please set your trap at night and if your trap is empty in the early morning, trigger the trap and reset again at night.
