The School Year Came to an End with a Tour & Field Trip!

Our Humane Education Teachers concluded the 2021- 2022 school year visiting with Virtual Academy students, their families, and friends. This was the first time these students met their teachers in person all year.



In March, we visited their virtual classroom and brought their research based state test preparation about service animals to life by showing how Lisa trains Maverick to become a service dog. The students read three articles about service dogs and had to answer the question, "What qualities are needed in a service dog?". We also learned very quickly that this was an animal loving, kind-hearted class. After sharing with the class about the Stars of Hope Organization, we decided, as a class, to set a date to come together and continue spreading kindness to the world together.

Earlier in the day, we learned all about the Stars of Hope, what they represent, and why we make them. The students planned their stars on paper and allowed the creativity to flow as they put their hearts into these creations. All in all, the kids were excited to know that their star would one day be someplace where hope is needed. Cruelty Investigation Program

Opossum Rescue!

Sometimes animals get themselves into unusual and potentially dangerous situations. This happened a few weeks ago to a young opossum who thought the engine of a Camaro would be a neat hiding place. Fortunately for the opossum, the car owner realized the critter was in her engine and thought it would be too dangerous to drive the car. The car owner contacted us at the HSSBV and our staff headed out to help!

Upon arrival on the very hot summer afternoon, we located the opossum in the Camaro engine bay. Thankfully, we found the opossum was okay, just refusing to leave the engine. Our staff explained to the car owner that we could not take apart anything on the car due to liability issues, but the owner was concerned for the safety of the animal. After several attempts to access the opossum, we were able to encourage it into an accessible area by gently squirting it with water and safely remove it without any damage to the car, our staff, or the now damp opossum.

The opossum was transported to the HSSBV clinic and examined by our veterinarians. It was determined that the animal was slightly dehydrated and hot, but otherwise healthy. The opossum spent the next few hours at the HSSBV getting rehydrated and cooling off. By the end of the day, the opossum was ready for release and was relocated.

While HSSBV does not employ mechanics or contractors who can take apart cars or buildings to get to a trapped animal, you can always call us to see if we can assist. We help where we can and advise people to critter proof their property. This situation ended happily due to the car owner caring for an unlucky animal and realizing it needed help. Fortunately we were able to rescue and relocate the opossum! As always, be a voice for those that don't have one.










From the Vet's Desk-Dr. Joyce & Dogtor Apollo





Over 25% of cats and dogs seen by a veterinarian are overweight. This statistic should prompt every pet owner to be vigilant and monitor their dog or cat weight. Any excess weight is harmful to the pet health.

Why is my pet no longer at an ideal weight?

Excess weight occurs gradually when the pet takes in more energy than it expends. Any unused calories ingested are stored in the form of fat. This results in an accumulation of excess fat in the body. Some breeds (such as the Labrador) are known to be prone to weight gain. However, a good healthy diet will enable them to maintain their ideal weight.

A neutered pet[®] metabolism is lower. But the pet will not necessarily gain weight if its diet and daily feeding amount are adapted to its life style and it has a sufficient amount of exercise.

Causes of excess weight

Excessive Calorie Intake

- Food high in fat
- Constant access to highly palatable foods
- Excess food consumption (snacks, left-overs)


Insufficient Calorie Expenditure

- Low metabolism (depending on breed, sex, age)
- Low level of physical activity

What are the effects of excess weight on my pets health?

Dogs and cats who are overweight or obese are more vulnerable and more prone to develop certain diseases.

A shorter life expectancy – It has been proven that overweight dogs have shorter lives than those of a normal body weight. Below is a chart of average life expectancy of overweight and normal pets, separated by breed. As you can see, overweight pets have a much shorter lifespan!



Joint diseases (such as osteoarthritis) – In large breeds, excess weight can lead to joint disorders that are often irreversible. A vicious circle develops in an overweight pet suffering from joint disease: the heavier it is, the less it will move about.

Cardiac and respiratory diseases

Diabetes mellitus – Overweight cats are six times more likely to develop diabetes mellitus compared to cats with an ideal body weight.

Poor coat and skin quality

Increased surgical and/or anesthetic risks

What are the keys to success?

1. Your motivation – Your own personal involvement is a key factor in the success of your dog s or cat diet. You are responsible for controlling his/her diet, treats, snacks and level of exercise. Without your determination to succeed, weight loss is impossible.

2. Diet – It is important to limit the amount of calories that your pet is getting. We recommend switching your pets food to a:

- Prescription diet food: Prescription diet foods are designed to be lower in calories, and have the best chance of achieving weight loss. These diets often contain a fiber blend from fruits and vegetables to help your pet feel full and satisfied between meals. This is the best option for your pet to lose weight. Please contact our office if you want to switch your pet to a prescription diet food.
- 2. Over the counter (OTC) weight loss formulas: These foods are labeled as Dight", "weight loss", or Ddiet" dog foods. They are lower in calories per kibble than regular kibble. They are often slightly calorie restricted, so they can help your pet lose weight. If your pet is not successful on an OTC diet food, it is recommended to switch to a prescription diet food.

3. Feed an appropriate amount of food – It doesn[®] matter what your pet eats if they consume too much of it. Look at the side of the bag of dog food. Look at how much it says to feed for your pets ideal body weight (not current weight). Measure out the exact amount of food required each day, using a standard measuring cup. This simple gesture is vital in controlling the amount of food your pet consumes. You can divide up this amount and spread it over two (or even three) meals throughout the day.

4. No snacks – Give your pet nothing to eat other than his daily health food ration. No snacks, no left-over^B. Rewards him by taking him for a walk or playing games, or even save a few of his kibbles from each meal and use those as treats.

5. Exercise – Encourage your pet to take some exercise: play with your dog or cat, take him out for regular walks and play games throughout the day.

6. Rechecks – It is important to monitor your pets progress by weighing every 2-4 weeks. If weight loss is not successful by 3 months, call to schedule an exam for your pet so that we can discuss next steps.
