# April 2020 HSSBV Remains Committed to Helping Animals During Pandemic



The Humane Society of San Bernardino Valley (HSSBV) has been closely monitoring the COVID-19 activity locally and nationally. Because we care about the animals and people in our community, and as an essential service, we are taking measures to stay open while mitigating exposure for our employees and community members out of concern for public health.

Effective Monday, March 30, 2020 we have suspended performing spay and neuter surgeries. Fighting pet overpopulation remains our mission and focus. However, during this national and worldwide pandemic, we support and are following recommendations of the AVMA, CDC and WHO. This is a temporary change to service and we look forward to returning to offering low cost spay and neuter surgeries soon.

Also, effective, Monday, March 30, 2020, we are offering the following services by appointment only Monday – Friday from 8:30 am – 4:30 pm:

- Vaccines for puppies and kittens
- Rabies vaccines for pets of any age
- Urgent care/emergency (including illness, injury, prescription refill, etc)
- Euthanasia

If you are not clear if your pet can be seen for services, or if you would like to make an appointment, please call 909-386-1400.

We appreciate your patience during this challenging time. Please be aware hold times on the phone and the check in/out process for appointments may be longer than usual. Changes made to our regular process are for the protection and safety of the public, as well as our staff.

If you or anyone in your household are currently experiencing an active respiratory illness, we ask that you please schedule any appointments with us at least 14 days after the illness has passed.

As a reminder, the HSSBV offers all of our services for low cost. Additionally, we have financial assistance programs available for senior citizens, as well as low income clients or clients who have recently become unemployed. These programs are offered on a first come, first serve basis, while funding lasts. Please be aware that an application with the proper documentation will be needed in order to apply. Applying is not a guarantee of assistance.

The HSSBV Cruelty Investigation Program remains open at this time. If you suspect cruelty or neglect to an animal, please call 909-386-1400 ext 216 or 215. You can also fill out an online cruelty report at www.hssbv.org.

# A Look Back at 50 Years of Helping Animals-Guest Writer, Legislative Committee

What better way to remember the HSSBV's deep 50 year history, than hearing from those who were there? In this issue we hear from the HSSBV Legislative Committee.

There are a variety of ways community members volunteer to help animals at the Humane Society of San Bernardino Valley. One of the lesser known opportunities is the Animal Legislative Committee! Formed over 15 years ago, the committee started out very informally. "We didn't even really have a name back then. It was very informal. We initially had more of an education focus since most of us had come from careers in education, but then we grew into the Legislative Committee," says Marilyn Sauer, an original committee member.

The purpose of the committee now is to stay informed of legislation regarding animals in our state and nationwide. Committee members often write letters to congressperson about these issues and communicate updates to HSSBV staff. The committee, who currently has seven members, meets once a month in the HSSBV conference room.

Carole Autler, Legislative Committee President, originally started volunteering in the HSSBV Recovery Department. She then moved to the office area, assisting with paper work, grants and fundraising. "I really enjoy the education part of it. I am always learning something new and I hope everyone else is learning too," she says. Carole credits the Legislative Committee as introduction to the pet therapy work she now does!

Marilyn Sauer, who has been with the committee since its inception, also shares that she has learned a lot, especially from Carole who organizes the agendas for each meeting. She also shares, "We started out just meeting to discuss different issues. Then we worked on becoming a liaison between the HSSBV and the city, and legislative issues."

Marlyn Taub was also one of the earliest members. She was first introduced to the HSSBV when she set up a craft table at the Santa Paws event. After that, late member Sue Herbert, a member at the time, invited her in. "I learned a lot and I have made good friends," she says.

Ethel McAfee is a former HSSBV board member and recovery volunteer! After retiring from both of these position she missed the HSSBV and thought this was a great way to get involved again. Similar to the other members, Ethel says she has learned so much being on the Legislative Committee. "I was not aware of all of the many issues facing animals, and all they go through."

While teaching in Fontana, Angela Grogan had seen the HSSBV Humane Education Program first hand. She also ran the "Kids Care About Animals Club!" After retiring she wanted to volunteer in this area after the disturbing stories students had shared with her about treatment of animals in the community. Angela especially enjoys this committee because of the activism, as she says, "Nothing will change until it is the law. That is the key."

Carolina Figueroa, attended her first meeting with Sue Herbert. "At first I just listened. Then I was able to bring in friends and some presenters," she remembers. "I enjoy being a part of this group. I also use this to bring information back to my children about how to treat animals."

Judy Hopkins is another former Recovery Department volunteer. "Ethel invited me to join," she says. "I have only been on the committee for 6-7 months and I have enjoyed it." Judy also volunteers as a LA Zoo docent!

All of the Legislative Committee members remember fondly those members who have passed away over the years, including Joyce Martin, Brent Autler, Sue Dawson, Sue Herbert and Kim Manning.

"Everyone here brings something different to the committee. We each have our own expertise. We invite anyone who is interested to join. You can even come to one meeting, just to test it out," Carole says.

# **Cruelty Investigation Department:** Watching Out for Local Wildlife

The weather is warming up and all kinds of animals are coming out and getting ready to have babies or are looking for new food and water sources. Some people encounter problems when this happens because these animals may take up residence on their property which may cause property damage. We and other animal welfare organizations routinely get calls to help with feral cats, opossums, raccoons, rabbits, various birds and other wildlife. When this happens it is always a sticky situation for both the property owner and the animal. It is illegal to harm any animal, even wildlife. Please follow the following suggestions when dealing with these kinds of situations.

The first thing a person should do is make sure that they have taken appropriate steps to safeguard their property by cleaning up all debris, junk, clutter, and keep vegetation pruned and trimmed so animals and wildlife have no place to make a home. People should also make sure that their homes and other buildings are secure with no holes or exposed crawl spaces that allow an entry point. Most important is making sure there are no water sources such as puddles, leaking hoses/faucets or other water sources available that would tempt an animal to drink. It is also important to keep trash picked up and trash cans secured and pick up any outside pet food. This lessens the chances of an animal hanging around for available snacks. Do not give an animal a reason to hang out at your property.

If these suggestions fail there are still additional steps that can be taken. Hazing can discourage animals from hanging around your property. Hazing is using loud or annoying noises, lighting, and liquid repellants to keep animals away. Using steel wool and caulking compoud to clog up small holes works really well on keeping rodents out because they can't chew the steel wool. Placing plastic animals (such as owls) keeps smaller animals away as they fear being eaten. Some commercial liquid repellants (bitter apple or bear repellants) available in hardware stores have been successful as well because animals don't like or fear the scents.

If none of these suggestions work there is always seeking help from professional and licensed animal removal services and wildlife removal services.

The last option would be humane trapping. This is the use of a humane trap that is set with food bait. The animal goes in for the food and the door closes and traps the animal for transport to your local animal shelter or release. Before you attempt to trap any animal you must be warned that there are many laws and regulations (too many to list here) governing what animals can be trapped, any licenses and permits needed, places to take the animals once trapped, and care for the animal during trapping process. Failure to follow any trapping guidelines and laws could lead to criminal prosecution. Trapping animals is serious and if you choose this route, you are liable for the wellbeing of the trapped animal and subject to California Law regarding humane treatment of animals.

We cannot emphasize enough that animals and wildlife are part of our daily life They have always been around us and will continue to get closer to us as the human world expands. Perhaps the kindest and most humane course of action is to limit the temptations for animals and accept our responsibility to ensure that we have taken all steps to critter proof our homes. Remember that animals are just like you and me; they are trying to make it through the day and don't want to be messed with. If there is no reason to hang out at a property then they will move on.

Before taking any course of action, always contact your local animal care/control, humane society, or the Department of Fish and Wildlife for help and guidance. If you suspect any animal, wild or domestic, is being harmed or cruelly treated, please call us and be a voice for those that don't have one.

### **Can my pet dog or cat get the new coronavirus (COVID-19)?** At this time, experts believe that there is no evidence that pets can pass this disease to humans. Experts are unsure if humans can pass it on to their pets, but it is thought to be highly unlikely. In an abundance of caution, the CDC recommends that people who are sick with COVID-19 should restrict contact with pets and other animals, just like you would restrict your contact with other people. When possible, a member of the household other than the individual who is ill should care for any animals in the household. Those infected with COVID-19 should avoid contact with animals, including petting, snuggling, being kissed or licked, and sharing food. Those who must care for a pet, or who will be around animals while sick, should wear an appropriate facemask and

# What should I do if my pet becomes ill after being around someone who has been sick with COVID-19?

Talk with the public health official working with the person who is ill with COVID-19. Your public health official can then consult with a public health veterinarian, who will advise you on further steps/testing.

## What can I do to ensure my pet is safe during this outbreak?

You should make arrangements to ensure that your pet gets proper care in case you need to self-isolate or go to the hospital. It is best to ensure that you have an emergency kit prepared, with at least two weeks of your pet's food and any needed medications. The kit should also include a copy of your pets vet records. Ask around and identify a family member, friend, or neighbor who could care for your pet in case you have to go to the hospital.

## What activities can I do with my pet during this stay-at-home order that will keep us entertained?

- Your pet would love all of the extra play and cuddle time with you!

- If your pup seems bored, you can try a puzzle toy for them. There are various ones sold online, so pick one that seems to be an appropriate difficulty for your dog. These toys are a great way to keep your dog entertained and mentally stimulated!

- You could sign up for online dog training classes! There are numerous dog training companies shifting their focus to online classes.

- If you dog already knows a few tricks, you could consider having them work to earn their Trick Dog title! You do the training at home, upload a video showing that your pet can do certain tricks, and your dog can earn a title/certificate. More information at: www.domorewithyourdog.com
